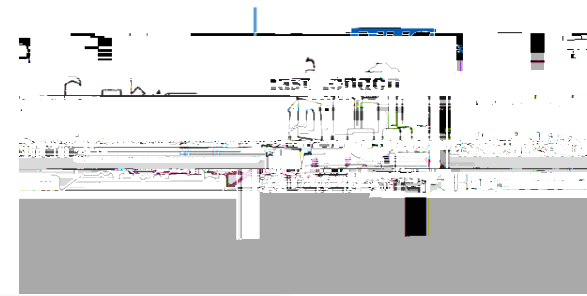


Think Ahead and Skills for Care, funded by HEE London, mapped existing ASYE provision across London Trusts to greater understand:

Current landscape



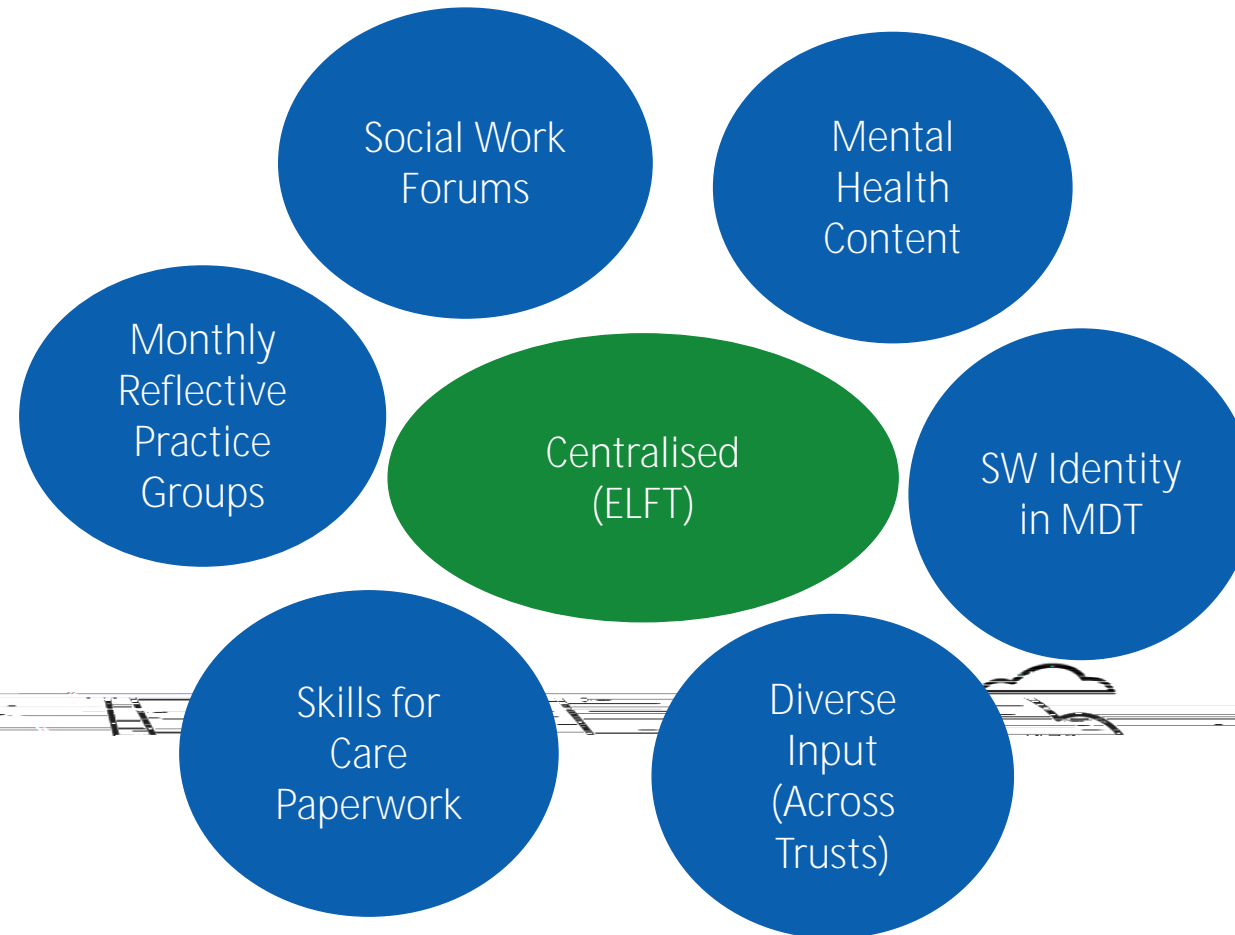


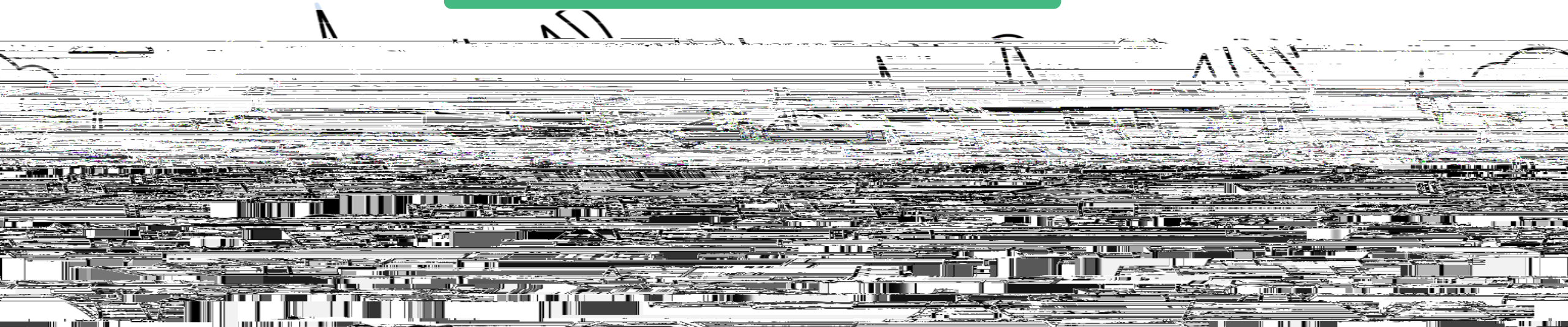
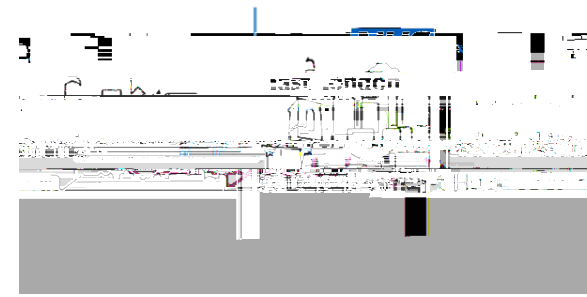


- Contributes to 'one profession' view

- Consistency

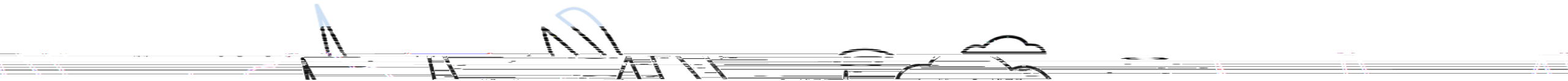






Increased recruitment of NQSWs
